## What's In A Name: Clues to Ethnicity & Alternative Spellings

Surnames were initially used, often associated with geography, physical appearance, occupation, farm names, and naming patterns (patronymic is one variation) to identify a particular person or family especially as population centers grew. In researching our family, "road blocks" sometimes occur because we forget to try name changes and variations in records searches.

There are four basic ways that surnames vary in development over the centuries:

- O Locale names Boisvert (French; someone from near a forest; translated to "wood green"), Surrey (someone living near the village of Surrey), Woods, Fields
- O Names of office or occupation de la Salle (French; added to a name, in this case, a famous explorer his title was Sieur (Lord) of la Salle), Carpenter, Chevalier (French for soldier)
- O Nicknames or descriptions of physical appearance or behavior Philip the Bald, Robert the Red, Richard the Lion-Hearted
- Patronymic naming systems Primarily in the Scandinavian countries; Peter, son of Harold Jorgenson, is Peter Haroldsson.

There are four basic ways that surname variations and changes occur:

- O Simple spelling changes: Elliot, Eliot, Eliott, Elliotte
- Changes made legally: Using the courts, an ancestor may have changed their name permanently.
- O "Anglicizing" surnames in coming to America: Making names easier to pronounce.
- O Moving from foreign languages into and out of English: Did the ancestor live in an area where another language was spoken? Or come from a region where there was a language other than English?
