


In Remembrance

Did you know that the Bay City Directories from 1893 through 1911 included a separate listing for the people living in the townships? In those early years there is no street address but it does include the township, section, acres owned, value of the property and post office or rural mail route.

There are also a few rural directories in the Local History and Genealogy Room at the Alice and Jack Wirt Public Library.

# Facebook (Bay County Genealogical Society-Michigan)

As of January 4, 2025, there are 369 members in the Society's Facebook group.
